# MISSION

The Leonard D. Schaeffer Fellows in Government Service program exposes undergraduate students to government work and its impact through 10-week, full-time, highlevel internship placements with elected officials and agencies at the federal, state, and local levels. While not all Schaeffer Fellows pursue a career in government, the program creates the opportunity for participants to become engaged citizens and develop an informed view of government service and operations.

hen I was an undergraduate, I worked as a government intern. I learned how government operates and was exposed to the significance of public service work and its impact on society. My mentors introduced me to their colleagues who helped me develop the skills required in both the public and private sectors. The Schaeffer Fellows in Government Service program seeks to provide a similar experience for our Fellows. In seven years, we have placed 270 Schaeffer Fellows at more than 125 different internship sites and introduced them to an alumni mentor from their university.

In the Summer of 2021, we were proud to support highlevel government internships for 45 Schaeffer Fellows. Most were placed in remote internship positions, with some in hybrid work settings. Our university partners helped to expand the program to new internship sites, and we complimented the internship experience with the Schaeffer Fellows Summit Series, a set of virtual professional development sessions which we hosted throughout the summer. This year's Schaeffer Fellows Summit focused on fostering civil discourse in public service. Our institutional partners at the Brookings Institution, RAND, and the Partnership for Public Service led discussions about election integrity, racial and ethnic injustice, visionary leadership, and the role research plays in developing public policy and public opinion. Our online community of alumni helped to mentor the Fellows about post graduate opportunities in public service.

As you will see in the pages that follow, our Schaeffer Fellows had a remarkable impact on the offices they supported and the communities they served. At the local, state, and federal levels of government, Schaeffer Fellows contributed to government efforts to support those impacted by COVID-19. They responded to constituent needs and community issues and utilized their talents to support public policy research and promote civil discourse.

I am confident that our Fellows, as informed citizens, will provide the resiliency and leadership that this country needs as it faces years of rebuilding after the COVID-19 pandemic.

# IMPACT

Since 2015, the Leonard D. Schaeffer Fellows program has supported 270 Fellows in over 125 different government offices and agencies. The program supports up to fifty Schaeffer Fellows each summer, and program alumni remain engaged through events and as mentors.

# 2021 COHORT
