A LETTER FROM OUR FOUNDER

As a college sophomore, I was offered an opportunity to intern in government. At the time, I was unsure about what I hoped to gain from the experience and unclear about my post-graduate plans. The internship introduced me to real government work and showed me the impact one could have on their community and public policy more broadly. Through the guidance of an alumni mentor, I developed skills in networking and professional communications that aided me throughout my career in the public and private sectors. The Schaeffer Fellows in Government Service program was established to provide a meaningful experience in government for undergraduates and encourage their engaged citizenship the way my internship did all those years ago. Since 2015, we have placed 318 Schaeffer Fellows at more than 160 different internship sites, and each has been paired with an alumni mentor from their university.

In the summer of 2022, 50 Schaeffer Fellows interned in high-level government internships at the federal, state, and local levels. They contributed to policy research, investigated cold cases, advocated for resources to support community programs, and responded to constituent concerns. Irrespective of placement, they learned the intricacies of government work and operations and saw first-hand the dedication of countless public servants who play a role in supporting our democracy every day. While many internships returned to the office setting, a number remained hybrid or remote and I expect this trend to continue. This has had a direct impact on the Fellows and our program, making it all the more important to bring everyone together for the Schaeffer Fellows Summit in Washington, D.C. Over three days, the Fellows debriefed their internship experiences, learned lessons in leadership from public service professionals and program alumni, visited the National Mall, and established relationships with one another that will grow as they become Schaeffer Fellow Alumni.

As you will see in the pages that follow, our Schaeffer Fellows had a remarkable impact on the offices they supported and the communities they served. Each year our Fellows reaffirm that if they are the future of public service then our country will be able to successfully address its challenges.













OUR MISSION

The Leonard D. Schaeffer Fellows in Government Service program exposes undergraduate students to government work and its impact through 10week, full-time, high-level internship placements with elected officials and agencies at the federal, state, and local levels. While not all Schaeffer Fellows pursue a career in government, the program creates the opportunity for participants to become engaged citizens and develop an informed view of government service and operations.

PILLARS OF PUBLIC SERVICE

June 2022 brought the return of an in-person Schaeffer Fellows Summit in Washington, D.C. for the national cohort. As a professional conference, the Summit provides Schaeffer Fellows the opportunity to participate in interactive sessions alongside their peers against the backdrop of the nation's capitol and surrounded by the history and rich traditions of our democracy.

The Summit, aptly themed "Pillars of Public Service", provided Schaeffer Fellows with a space for building camaraderie as a cohort, interacting with leaders in public service, meeting local alumni, and conversing about core values and commitments to action. With guest speakers, workshops, and time to explore D.C., Fellows departed the weekend reflective of their early government experience and equipped with tools to maximize networking and professional development in the remaining weeks of their internships.

INTERACTIVE SESSIONS

Schaeffer Fellows participated in small group discussions and activities with their shared interest Schaeffer Fellow Pods as well as with their university's cohort. Session topics included examining the role of core values in the workplace, strategies for networking, pursuing post-graduate opportunities, and commitment to community action. The Schaeffer Fellows Resource Guide provided a foundation for Summit activities in addition to expanding on transferable skill building. Fellows shared their work experiences to date and were encouraged to consider new methods for engaging in new projects and expanding professional relationships.

"SAVING AMERICAN DEMOCRACY"

Leonard Schaeffer shared his personal story of how he "saved American democracy" as an undergraduate intern on the Hill and discussed his perspective on navigating a career in the public and private sectors. He encouraged Fellows to form mutual connections with mentors, be forthcoming about their skills and interests, and follow a career path that aligns with their values.

ENGAGING WITH ALUMNI

Program alumni participated in the Summit as panelists, facilitators, and guests at the closing dinner. They shared how their Schaeffer Fellow government internship helped them navigate post-graduate opportunities such as competitive fellowships, graduate study, and the workforce. Alumni emphasized setting short- and long-term goals and the importance of good mentorship.

Ambassador Jeffrey Feltman is the John C. Whitehead Visiting Fellow in International Diplomacy in the Foreign Policy program at the Brookings Institution and Senior Fellow at the United Nations Foundation. He spoke about his more than 26 years as a U.S. Foreign Service Office, reinforcing the value of public service and the importance of remaining globally minded as we look to the future of our democracy.

Zane's advice: "Don't be afraid to reach out to members of your university alumni network. People are very willing to help. If you plan to pursue public interest or government work, do extensive research on your law school's loan repayment program before committing."



Angela's advice: "Law school is a big commitment so seek out opportunities to learn more about the profession and lawyers' day-to-day work. I really enjoyed my first year of law school, which is generally considered the most difficult year. I would encourage aspiring law students to seek out community among their fellow students; law school can be a great place to meet other public service/justice-minded folks."
